The Broadband Services Division conducted governance meetings, such as the CalFRN Board and AT&T/FirstNet PSBN Meetings to discuss the progress of FirstNet deployment in California. BSD utilized broadband conferences to gain more knowledge of emerging and existing broadband technologies, and to network with industry professionals. Individuals of the BSD were also involved in meeting with stakeholders in their respective counties to discuss the FirstNet network capabilities, new local control updates, FirstNet apps, and the AT&T site build out in California. BSD is working on a process to identify public safety users in California. BSD continues to meet with CalSIEC Board members to discuss and plan for future technologies that could be utilized in emergency response. We attend and participate in the CalSIEC's Planning Area Committees in all four regions in California. One member of our team also participated in a FirstNet-sponsored Search and Rescue Exercise (SAREX) with Santa Clara County's Sheriff's Office. Kristi Mercado From AT&T / FirstNet invited LI Nielsen to attend this FirstNet event, where FirstNet services and devices were demastrated to the County Sheriff's department.

The individuals sent to broadband conferences this quarter are Shelly McMahon, LI Nielsen, Sophia Munoz. Our broadband conferences include the monthly Northern Chapter of APCO, meetings in conjuction with AT&T regarding FirstNet. PSAP
