The members focused on reviewing and commenting on recommendations two and three of their document. They worked to clarify what the subcommittee's intention for the recommendations was and whether it has been achieved. There was a lot of progress made and one member volunteered to incorporate the comments into those recommendations and make them clearer. The subcommittee does have a question for Ms. Atkins for clarification on NTIA's role and level of authority over the federal agencies with respect to data classification; this will follow in a few days. Time ran out to discuss the committees next questions and the members decided these could be discussed via e-mail and finalized at the next meeting in January. Recommending type of spectrum issues NTIA can prioritize for enhanced collaboration to include those requiring sensitive/classified information exchanges.</li> <li>2. Recommending how can NTIA most effectively leverage existing or emerging entities to include CSMAC, PPSG, NASCTN, and CAC to streamline efforts, minimizing the burden on participating organizations.</li> <li>3. Modification, if any, of the draft framework to most efficiently and effectively achieve the desired collaboration.</li> <li>• <u>Expected Focus of Work</u>— Question 3. For question 2 limited discussions have taken place on PPSG and CSMAC, but no details. Q1 has not been discussed so far</li> <li>• <u>Targeted Completion Date</u>— Feb 09 for Q3. TBD for (Q1) and (Q2) – will base it on the discussions at the CSMAC meeting.</li> <li>• <u>Goal(s) Discussed at Last CSMAC Meeting</u>— (1) Progress on the previous collaboration framework document. (2) Discuss Q1 and Q2 if time permits.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Subcommittee shelved its own earlier framework collaboration document, in response to question 3, since the subcommittee assessed that the feasibility of implementing the recommendations is not feasible under FACA regulations.</li> <li>• However, the subcommittee has prepared a new presentation recommending that NTIA in collaboration with FCC and federal agencies should initiate non-decision making discussions with affected stakeholders on spectrum issues. It also expressed concern on how to engage with federal agencies on national security concerns. It has asked NTIA to prioritize identifying additional spectrum below 6 GHz, in addition to the ongoing 3.5G and 5G.</li> <li>• Subcommittee is requesting information from NTIA on the next steps forward.</li> <li>• No specific comments on Q1, Q2 or any suggestions for subcommittee to continue or new issues to be discussed.</li> <li>• <u>Suggestion:</u></li> <li>• <b><u>1) consider acting on recommendation 1;</u></b></li> <li>• <b><u>2) Consider replacing subcommittee activity with small collaborative industry-government focus groups, with targeted issues and goals.</u></b></li> </ul>
