#### STATE AND LOCAL IMPLEMENTATION GRANT PROGRAM (SLIGP) 2.0

## **State of Georgia- Application Narrative**

The State of Georgia, via the Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency (GEMA/HS), is qualified to obtain, manage and complete the proposed State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) 2.0 within the program standards, as shown by a stellar track record of technical project management and expertise, stakeholder outreach and involvement, and grant management. Using a proven structure of local jurisdiction involvement and collaboration between state agencies, Georgia is ready to coordinate with the provider to implement a world-class National Public Safety Broadband Network (NPSBN) in the state.

GEMA/HS is nearing the end of its successful management of the SLIGP 1.0 grant program. The Governor desires for the Agency to pursue the SLIGP 2.0 grant opportunity and build upon our successes. Once the SLIGP 2.0 grant is awarded to Georgia, GEMA/HS intends to staff the next SLIGP effort with a full time NPSBN coordinator (SLIGP 2.0 grant funded), a partial effort of the Director of Local Government 9-1-1 Authority (50% grant funded), GEMA/HS executive, grants and support staff, and ad hoc support from key GEMA/HS field staff and other appropriate state agency personnel (See Budget Narrative for detail). GEMA/HS is confident that it will again provide a successful outcome for local governments, the state and its Federal and private sector providers for NPSBN.

#### **Intended Allowable Activities:**

GEMA/HS is committed to the successful implementation of a NPSBN in Georgia. To achieve this goal, Georgia, via GEMA/HS, intends to conduct the following allowable SLIGP 2.0 activities:

- Be the Single Officer (and governmental body) for NPSBN implementation efforts and to provide
  the GEMA/HS staff to manage the ongoing coordination with NTIA and the implementation of
  grant funds.
  - o GEMA/HS will maintain its support and chairmanship of the Statewide Public Safety
    Interoperability Executive Committee (PSIEC), which by Governor's Executive Order
    brings together representation from all levels of local government, state government,
    and the private sector to address Georgia's public safety broadband needs. GEMA/HS
    also maintains an experienced grant staff that successfully managed SLIGP 1.0.
- Use its existing governance body to provide input to the single officer and to contribute towards
  planning activities to further identify potential public safety users of the NPSBN and prepare for
  data sharing.
  - o The Georgia Statewide Public Safety Interoperability Executive Committee (PSIEC),
    brings together representation from all levels of local government, state government,
    and the private sector to address Georgia's public safety broadband needs. The
    Committee will be involved in the implementation of the NPSBN in Georgia.
- Data collection in specific areas identified to be helpful as requested by FirstNet.
  - GEMA/HS will use SLIGP funded staff to be responsive to data requests from FirstNet.
- Development of policies and agreements to increase sharing of data between existing public safety systems across various agencies within the State using the NPSBN.

- GEMA/HS intends to engage state and local public safety communicators and local 911
   centers to develop policy drafts and suggested procedures for use in implementing and integrating NPSBN into daily and specialized use across the state.
- GEMA/HS will perform planning activities to help the NPSBN provider/ partner further identify
  potential public safety users of the NPSBN in a manner useful to both the state and FirstNet.
- GEMA/HS will assist in planning efforts to help FirstNet gain inclusion on applicable statewide contract vehicles as applicable.
- GEMA/HS will contribute to planning activities to prepare for emergency communications
  technology transitions as well as activities to identify and plan for the transition of public safety
  applications, software, and databases.
- GEMA/Hs will interact with the NPSBN provider in the identifying and documenting of on-going coverage needs/gaps within the State.
- Activities to convene stakeholder outreach events to continue planning for NPSBN implementation, as requested by FirstNet.

By undertaking these logical tasks, GEMA/HS is committed to working to plan and implement the NPSBN, while working with the provider and adapting to the changing landscape of this effort. As the application shows, Georgia has the experience and staffing to implement the SLIGP process to coordinate with FirstNet or the chosen provider to undertake whatever effort is deemed necessary for success. Using established and effective methods for local involvement, Georgia is ready to move forward with the establishment of its portion of the NPSBN.

Capacity of GEMA/HS to manage and conduct programmatic activities of the SLIGP 2.0 award and ability to adhere to NTIA grant reporting and compliance requirements

The State of Georgia is qualified to complete the proposed State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) 2.0 within the program standards, as shown by a stellar track record of technical

project management and expertise, stakeholder outreach and involvement, and grant management of multiple federal grants, to include SLIGP 1.0. Using a proven structure of local jurisdiction involvement and collaboration between state agencies, Georgia is ready to continue to coordinate with FirstNet to implement a world-class National Public Safety Broadband Network (NPSBN).

GEMA/HS maintains an experienced staff and will continue the employ of these professionals who have managed the FirstNet coordination effort up to this point. Internal staffs have been dedicated to this effort since the acceptance of the original SLIGP grant, and have successfully marshaled the state through data collection, outreach, coverage needs and state plan negotiations.

In addition, GEMA/HS, as chair of and in coordination with the governance body known as the Georgia Statewide Public Safety Interoperability Executive Committee (PSIEC), brings together representation from all levels of local government, state government, and the private sector to address Georgia's public safety broadband needs.

The chair of this committee is the Director of the Georgia Emergency Management Agency/Homeland Security (GEMA/HS), who is the State Administrative Agency (SAA) for Department of Homeland Security grants. In this role, GEMA/HS has successfully managed well over \$500,000,000 in grants over the past 16 years. Additionally, GEMA/HS engages the state's well established regional Emergency Managers Association of Georgia (EMAG) and other statewide public safety professional organizations in processes that serve as a key advisory interfaces between local jurisdictions and GEMA/HS regarding public safety communications needs and successes.

Multiple state agencies are integrally involved in the work of the PSIEC. Two key agencies with experience in managing statewide systems include:

- Georgia Technology Authority (GTA) This agency manages the delivery of IT infrastructure services to 85 Executive Branch agencies and managed network services to 1,400 state and local government entities through a contract with IBM. IT infrastructure services encompass mainframes, servers, service desk, end user computing, disaster recovery and security; 14 agencies receive all of these services through GTA, while the remaining agencies may receive two or three of these services.

  GTA also oversees managed network services through a contract with AT&T, which includes the state's wide area network and voice. During 2008 Georgia Technology Authority (GTA) conducted a procurement to privatize the services associated with the operations of the State Data Center and the State Wide Area Network including data, voice and video communications services. Valued at \$1.3 billion, the procurement was completed with no bidder protests or lawsuits.
- Georgia Department of Public Safety (DPS) As home of the Georgia State Patrol (GSP), DPS acts as business manager of the Georgia Interoperability Network (GIN), a broadband-enabled gateway system that connects the land mobile radio (LMR) systems of all 159 counties in Georgia, as well as 5-6 state agencies. The Georgia Interoperability Network (GIN) is an excellent example of Georgia's experience in bringing local jurisdictions together with multiple state agencies to implement a broadband-enabled system. Leveraging funding from various grant programs, GEMA/HS in cooperation with the Georgia Technology Authority and the Department of Public Safety, led the procurement effort, system design, stakeholder outreach, system acceptance, and training and exercise development and delivery for the system. The system, which started rollout in 2005, is now in almost 200 locations and ties together the public safety dispatch centers and radio systems of 159 counties and six state agencies.

The other agencies participating actively in the PSIEC include:

- Georgia Sheriff's Association

- Association County Commissioners of Georgia

These agencies and associations have vast experience in the current operational and inter-operational communication capabilities of their respective public safety entities, and are actively pursuing opportunities to address the future needs of the public safety community. As standing members of the PSIEC, they competently represent their constituents and disciplines to ensure that their public safety communications needs are voiced and considered in all decisions.

### **GEMA/HS Staffing effort for SLIGP-2.0**

GEMA/HS will assign SLIGP 2.0 tasks to the following personnel for the anticipated two year effort:

PSBN Coordinator- will spend 100% of their time overseeing the task execution of the SLIGP
grant. The PSBN coordinator will be responsible for overall management of the SLIGP planning
and implementation initiatives and the coordinating of the activities of all other participants.

- Director of Local Government 9-1-1 Authority- will spend 50% of his time coordinating with the 911 community and explore impacts and plan integration of the NPSBN into current E911 and Next Gen 911. Will plan for potential uses, needs, capabilities and desired functioning of PSBN in the 911 environment.
- Manager of Preparedness Programs and Federal Grants- Will devote 10% time to perform
  administrative grant functions for the program. This individual will assure compliance to grant
  terms and conditions, track expenditures and track match. Will also prepare internal and
  external programmatic reports.
- Agency Director- will devote 10% of time serving as the liaison between GEMA/HS and other local and state agency directors and political entities in Georgia.
- Finance Grants Administrator- will spend 5% of her time writing, interpreting and executing
   State and Federal financial reports related to the SLIGP grant funds.
- GEMA/HS Legal Counsel- will spend 10% of his time will serving as the SLIGP and NPSBN legal reviewer, handle records requests, and assist in legal counsel and provider contract reviews.

#### **Contractors**

Implementation of the FirstNet in Georgia includes contract services for planning from the Georgia Tech Research Institute (GTRI), a sister State of Georgia governmental agency to GEMA/HS. GTRI provided neutral technical expertise and advice related to all communications issues surrounding and including PSBN. GTRI can also provide assistance with PSBN development through consultation on strategies, data collection and collation, subcontracts, and program management.

The GTRI contract will be used to cover the time of research-level personnel to perform these duties, with student employee providing targeted assistance as required. This effort will be modeled after GTRI's successful work with GEMA/HS over the past 10+ years. The average senior- or principal-level

GTRI employee has an hourly rate of ~\$200 (approved by the Office of Naval Research under FAR 31 regulations).

GEMA will look for contract assistance for Planning activities to prepare for emergency communications technology transitions to include:

- Activities to identify and plan for the transition of public safety applications, software, and databases;
- Identifying and documenting on-going coverage needs/gaps within the State; and
- Activities to convene stakeholder outreach events to continue planning for NPSBN implementation, as requested by FirstNet.

### **Summary**

GEMA/HS is well placed as the state's Emergency Management Agency to coordinate and execute a NPSBN effort in and for Georgia. GEMA/HS has vast federal grant management experience, including the successful management of the SLIGP 1.0 grant. GEMA/HS has a solid and comprehensive rapport with local public safety disciplines of all types across the state. GEMA/HS is recognized as the agency of choice for the planning, coordination and implementation of complex, grant funded public safety communication projects, and has again been designated by the Governor as the governmental body to shepherd this project. GEMA/HS is positioned to leverage other state assets and agencies to gain subject matter expertise and advice on this project, and has vast experience acting as the liaison between local and federal concerns. We look forward to the favorable approval of our SLIGP 2.0 application.

#### **SLIGP 2.0**

### **Georgia - Detailed Budget Justification**

Implementation of Georgia's State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) **2.0** will require allocation of funds in two broad categories: personal services and planning activities. The two year budget for this effort consists of **a total of \$508,877 of which \$407,102** is **Federal, and \$101,775** is **non-Federal cash match.** Please see attached spreadsheet titled "Detailed Budget Spreadsheet Georgia" for cost breakdowns.

#### Personnel-

Implementation of the SLIGP will require contributions by the following personnel headquartered in the Georgia Emergency Management Agency/Homeland Security, the state agency responsible for statewide public safety communications, with a 2 year budget of \$197,956 in salary All Federal, and \$62,636 Non-federal.

- Public Safety Broadband (PSBN) Coordinator. This continuing position will be funded at 100% time and require a two year budget expenditure of \$100,000 All Federal. The PSBN coordinator will be responsible for overall management of the SLIGP initiative and coordinating the activities of all other participants.
- Director of Local Government 9-1-1 Authority- will spend 50% of his time coordinating with the 911 community and explore impacts and plan integration of the NPSBN into current E911 and Next Gen 911. Will plan for potential uses, needs, capabilities and desired functioning of PSBN in the 911 environment. Two year budget of \$42,500 Federal, \$42,500 non- federal.
- Manager of Preparedness Programs and Federal Grants- Will devote 10% time to perform
  administrative grant functions for the program. This individual will assure compliance to grant
  terms and conditions, track expenditures and track match. Will also prepare internal and
  external programmatic reports. Two year Budget of \$17,300, all Federal.
- Agency Director- will devote 10% of time serving as the liaison between GEMA/HS and other local and state agency directors and political entities in Georgia. Two year budget of \$32,640, all Federal.
- Finance Grants Administrator- will spend 5% of her time writing, interpreting and executing State and Federal financial reports related to the SLIGP grant funds. **Two year budget of \$5,516**, all Federal.
- GEMA/HS Legal Counsel- will spend 10% of his time will serving as the SLIGP and NPSBN legal reviewer, handle records requests, and assist in legal counsel and provider contract reviews.
   Two year budget of \$20,136, all non-Federal.

#### Fringe Benefits

Fringe Benefits calculations for two years for the above listed positions are shown in this section. Benefits include FICA & Medicare (7.65%), Health Insurance (30.454%), and Retirement (24.81%). Calculations are shown in proportion the anticipated time each position will spend on eligible SLIGP activities. The fringe benefit is calculated at 62.914% of salary. The two year total for all fringe is \$124,542 Federal, \$39,139 non-Federal.

- Public Safety Broadband (PSBN) Coordinator. \$62,914 all Federal.
- Director of Local Government 9-1-1 Authority. \$26,739 Federal, \$26,471 non-Federal.
- Manager of Preparedness Programs and Federal Grants. \$10,884 all Federal.
- Agency Director. \$20,535 all Federal.
- Finance Grants Administrator. \$3,470 all Federal.

• GEMA/HS Legal Counsel. \$12,668 all non-Federal.

### <u>Travel</u>

A two year travel budget of \$32,752 (all Federal) is required for the cost of GEMA/HS personnel to attend SLIGP meetings within the state and for stakeholders outside the agency to attend FirstNet meetings and trainings in and out of Georgia. Breakdown is as follows:

- Travel for state personnel to attend informational and program meetings. Meeting schedule is as follows: Four employees traveling 200 miles roundtrip for 16 meetings. 12,800 miles x \$.58 /mile. \$7,424 all Federal.
- Funds for Technical Assistance Visits Four State employees visit each of eight GEMA regions to provide planning and technical assistance to local government partners in preparation for PSBN. Includes lodging, transportation and per diem. Two days per diem at \$56 per day and one nights hotel at \$123 per night (\$56+\$56+\$123=\$235). \$15,168 all Federal.
- Travel for Regional and National Meetings 4 PSIEC members will attend 4 post-award meetings. Airfare is estimated at \$395.00 per ticket; hotel is estimated at \$128 per night; per diem is estimated upon GSA per diem of \$56.00 per day. Each trip is estimated at two days/one night for a trip estimate of \$635.00. **\$10,160 all Federal.**

#### Supplies

A two year budget of \$14,252 **All Federal** is required to purchase telecommunication equipment to manage the program, computers, a printer, office supplies as well as office furniture to support the SLIGP program in Georgia.

#### **Contract Services**

GTRI-Georgia Tech Research Institute, a sister state agency, will provide technical consulting, continued plan development, SCIP revision and meeting coordination services. 70 hours per year for two years at \$200.00 per hour. **\$28,000 all Federal.** 

### Other-

Internet services to support all SLIG-P and FirstNet related activities by GEMA will amount to \$9,600 all Federal.

#### Match-

The State is supplementing this budget with the required cash match to be provided through State of Georgia funding.
