Application Narrative

This Application Narrative includes descriptions of the activities proposed to be undertaken by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts under the SLIGP 2.0 grant, addresses the capacity of the Commonwealth to successfully complete these activities, and details the staffing plan for this grant. Additional detail is included in the Budget Narrative document and Budget Detail spreadsheet.

Activities

a comprehensive explanation of the allowable activities that will be conducted using SLIGP 2.0 funds, how the applicant aims to resource and conduct these activities, the objectives and outcomes of these activities, and how conducting these activities will support the deployment of the NPSBN in their State. Note that applicants have the discretion to choose among the allowable activities described in section D.6.a, as it is not mandatory to perform all activities listed in that section;

Staff the Public Safety Broadband Office (PSBO)

The Commonwealth expects the responsibilities of the State Single Point of Contact (SPOC) to continue after the opt in/out decision. Undersecretary Wood will continue to serve as the SPOC for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and as such, will serve as the primary point of coordination amongst state, municipal, federal, and other stakeholders. As such, Undersecretary Wood will continue to need the support of the Public Safety Broadband Office to help accomplish day-to-day activities involving the SLIGP grant and state responsibilities for the proper use of the NPSBN.

Recurring PSBO activities include communications with stakeholders and first responders, planning and implementing SLIGP activities, managing content on the PSBO web site and other social media, participating in related meetings and councils, supporting ad hoc needs of the SPOC, preparing governance materials, and grant reporting. The Massachusetts SPOC and Project Director also will continue to participate on FirstNet organized webinars, on National Governor's Association peer networking calls, and on calls and meetings with the other regional leaders.

Support the Massachusetts FirstNet Advisory Board (MFAB) and EOPSS

Similar to the role of the SPOC, the activities of the Massachusetts FirstNet Advisory Board are anticipated to continue, although different in focus from the period leading up to the Governor's opt in/out decision. The MFAB will still be an important conduit for communicating with many of the large stakeholder groups in Massachusetts public safety and will be important in identifying and resolving implementation issues, stakeholder concerns, and access to local public safety data sources and applications. The PSBO will also serve as an important organization in support of the decision-making activities of the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security, in regard to the use of the NPSBN in Massachusetts.

Support FirstNet Authorized Data Collection Efforts

It is anticipated that FirstNet will continue to need the local access the SPOC and the PSBO can provide in supporting to be identified data collection efforts. The PSBO will continue to maintain tools, spreadsheets, and databases of key stakeholder information and will supplement this information as requested by FirstNet.

Support the Development of MOUs and Other Agreements

As the focus moves to the actual use of the NPSBN in Massachusetts, there will be more logistical and policy issues that will arise concerning mobile access to public safety information sources and applications, and the proper maintenance of those sources and access to them. These issues are often resolved with interagency discussions and working groups, technical advisory groups, and legal agreements. Often the outcomes of these agreements are documented in memorandums of understanding amongst the key partners. The Commonwealth envisions supporting these efforts as it relates to FirstNet under the activities of the SLIGP 2.0 grant.

Maintain Stakeholder Communications

A key activity of the SPOC and the PSBO has been to expand and update listings of public safety officials in the Commonwealth. The PSBO will continue to maintain a comprehensive contact list, including chiefs of police, chiefs of fire, emergency managers, EMS directors, chiefs of public and private college and university police, county Sheriffs, PSAP supervisors, and interested parties requesting to be included in PSBO communications lists. This information is used for an email LISTSERV for a PSBO newsletter.

The PSBO will continued to update the mass.gov/psbo web site with news articles covering FirstNet and the resulting Massachusetts State Plan. The web and blog sites are part of the PSBO's overall communications strategy for reaching out to stakeholders throughout the Commonwealth.

Help Oversee Public Safety Wireless Data Plans

The SPOC and the PSBO plan to help FirstNet and its partner with statewide contracting processes, as appropriate. In discussions with AT&T to date, AT&T has committed to provide the SPOC with versions of wireless service offerings before submitting them to the Commonwealth's Operational Services Division for inclusion on statewide blanket contracts. The focus of this effort will be to make sure the best available services are offered to Commonwealth public safety and to make sure the plans appropriately represent the commitments and discussions had over the past several months. The PSBO will also be available to help FirstNet and its partner better understand the state contracting procedures and to troubleshoot contracting issues, as appropriate.

Help Make Public Safety Services Available on the NPSBN

A significant and largely unexamined component of the full implementation of the envisioned NPSBN is the effort needed to make public safety data services available on wireless devices in the field. While some apps currently exists, many others do not. Local providers of records management systems, computer aided dispatch, criminal justice information, public health information, and others may need help in transforming their existing applications and data sources into a service that can be used effectively on mobile devices on the NPSBN. Often it is the sharing of best practices and development standards that can allow these local data sources to be made available to local users in the field. Additionally, it is anticipated that the introduction of NPSBN technical components like ICAM may require some local effort to be fully implemented. The PSBO can aid in this effort in Massachusetts.

Identify and Document Coverage Gaps and Needs

All wireless service providers have areas of coverage strength and areas of coverage need. Since Massachusetts is the third most densely populated state, our expectation is for near full wireless coverage throughout the state. As public safety officials use more and more mission critical

applications, the lack of access to these application and data sources become mission-hindering in areas of insufficient data coverage. The PSBO will examine tools to quantify coverage areas and will establish processes for actual users to report areas of insufficient coverage and capacity. These data points, then, can be share with FirstNet and its national partner to improve coverage within Massachusetts.

Hold Stakeholder Outreach Events

As requested by FirstNet and as approved as an allowable activity by NTIA, the PSBO will support FirstNet outreach needs within the Commonwealth. Depending upon the nature of the event, the PSBO can attend stakeholder meetings to provide presentations and answer questions, can coordinate the attendance of FirstNet and/or AT&T representatives at local meetings, or can hold regional outreach meetings to provide information to public safety officials throughout Massachusetts.

PSBO staff will continue to participate in recurring meetings of the Greater Boston Police Council, the Statewide Interoperability Executive Committee, the State 911 Commission, the Barnstable County 700 MHz Subcommittee, OpenCape (a state BTOP recipient), Massachusetts Broadband Institute (MBI) (a state BTOP recipient), and the UASI region network group (PSNet). This participation typically includes short updates and fielding NPSBN questions from stakeholders.

The PSBO will also continue to periodically reach out to representatives of the Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe and the Wampanoag of Gay Head Tribe to keep them up to date with FirstNet developments and will solicit coverage and other needs from those tribal bodies.

Capacity

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts Executive Office of Public Safety and Security (EOPSS) is the state's cabinet level public safety entity, overseeing budget and operations for the Commonwealth Public Safety Broadband Office (PSBO), Massachusetts State Police (MSP), Department of Criminal Justice Information Services (DCJIS), Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA), Department of Fire Services (DFS), State 911 Department (S911) and other critical public safety agencies – see www.mass.gov/eopss. EOPSS also works collaboratively with municipal, county, state and federal partners in areas of public safety and government administration by establishing and overseeing standards, providing training programs and state and federal grant administration.

EOPSS oversees the statewide law enforcement telecommunications network, public safety data center and Network Operations Center (NOC), providing municipal, county, state and federal law enforcement and justice organizations access to critical public safety data and communications interoperability. The network provides connectivity to more than 600 in-state law enforcement and justice agencies, supporting approximately 7,000 mobile devices across the state. This network also serves as the conduit to the National Law Enforcement Telecommunications System (NLETS) and the FBI CJIS Wide Area Network (WAN).

The Commonwealth's Public Safety Broadband Office (PSBO) oversees the implementation of public safety broadband across the state. Senior executives from the Public Safety Secretariat lead the office. Additional personnel include the State Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC) and senior management staff

from key public safety agencies. The Massachusetts FirstNet Advisory Board (MFAB) serves as an advisory body in matters relating to wireless public safety data communications and Massachusetts participation in the Nationwide Public Safety Broadband Network. The PSBO acts to assure the proper coordination of these activities.

Recent engagements have included the building of the state's public safety interoperability backbone, a multi-jurisdiction project funded by a combination of Public Safety Interoperability Communications (PSIC) Grant and state matching funds. EOPSS also worked with the Massachusetts Broadband Institute (MBI) and the Commonwealth's Information Technology Division (ITD) in building and deploying a broadband network across the western part of Massachusetts, connecting more than 300 public safety entities including police, fire, emergency management and Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPS) in 123 communities. EOPSS is also taking the lead in upgrading the Commonwealth's aging statewide land mobile radio system that is used by nearly 30,000 public safety users throughout Massachusetts.

Additionally, the PSBO successfully oversaw all SLIGP 1.0 activities, including grant reporting and compliance. This office is supplemented with grant expertise from the EOPSS Office of Grants and Research.

Staffing Plan

An experienced and knowledgeable executive with a long history of successful completion of projects, involving criminal justice information sharing, public safety communications, and broadband technology leads the EOPSS Public Safety Broadband Office. The leadership team is augmented with individuals who will perform many of the activities authorized under SLIGP 2.0. Unless otherwise noted, all the individuals and positions outlined are planned and budgeted throughout the duration of the grant.

- Curtis Wood, EOPSS Undersecretary, Forensic Science & Technology (Federal \$0, Non-Federal \$60,000): Undersecretary Wood will lead the PSBO providing oversight for the SLIGP grant, ensuring that all activities are completed on time and within budget. He will be the single point of contact for consultation with FirstNet and will work with the State's governance structure. The budgeted costs (20% time) are only for the duties associated with public safety broadband and the SLIGP grant. No fringe benefits are charged to the grant for this employee. The source of this match is the State's general fund and is not from another Federal source. The annual salary is \$150,000.
- Normand Fournier, Deputy Director State 911 Department (**Federal \$0, Non-Federal \$21,400**): The State 911 Department is charged with the coordination, administration, and implementation of Enhanced 9-1-1 and Next Generation 9-1-1 services throughout the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. He will participate in the PSBO, representing the growing needs of public safety data in Next Generation 9-1-1. The budgeted costs (10% time) are only for the duties associated with public safety broadband and the SLIGP grant. No fringe benefits are charged to the grant for this employee. The source of this match is the State's general fund and is not from another Federal source. The annual salary is \$107,000.
- John Ruggiero, Communications Engineer, Massachusetts State Police (Federal \$0, Non-Federal \$14,000): Mr. Ruggiero is an experienced communications engineer and has been a key player in statewide voice and data communications for the State Police. He brings an extensive knowledge of existing infrastructure, statewide public safety broadband and communication needs, and previous deployment challenges to the PSBO. The budgeted costs (10% time) are only for the duties associated with public safety broadband and the SLIGP grant. No fringe benefits are charged to the grant for this employee. The source of this match is the State's general fund and is not from another Federal source. The annual salary is \$70,000.
- James Slater, Commissioner, Department of Criminal Justice Information Services (DCJIS) (Federal \$0, Non-Federal \$24,800): The DCJIS operates a secure public safety data center and network that provides the critical infrastructure that supports information

sharing and interoperability for the Commonwealth's criminal justice and law enforcement community. Mr. Slater will add key input and experience in public safety data communications and requirements and how related services can be made available on the NPSBN. The budgeted costs (10% time) are only for the duties associated with public safety broadband and the SLIGP grant. No fringe benefits are charged to the grant for this employee. The source of this match is the State's general fund and is not from another Federal source. The annual salary is \$12,400.

- Tracy Varano, Special Projects Director, Executive Office of Public Safety and Security (EOPSS) (Federal \$0, Non-Federal \$19,800): Mrs. Varano provides project direction and management for critical public safety initiatives in the Commonwealth. Mrs. Varano will help arrange and manage office space, manage the PSBO team collaboration tool, and facilitate issue resolution for project issues. Mrs. Varano will add key input to achieving project milestones and managing project resources. The budgeted costs (10% time) are only for the duties associated with public safety broadband and the SLIGP grant. No fringe benefits are charged to the grant for this employee. The source of this match is the State's general fund and is not from another Federal source. The annual salary is \$99,000.
- David Cruz, Compliance and Data Coordinator, EOPSS Office of Grants and Research (OGR) (Federal \$6,840, Non-Federal \$0): Mr. Cruz performs grant management, program reporting, data collection, and program close out. The budgeted costs (5% time) are only for the duties associated with public safety broadband and the SLIGP grant. The annual salary is \$68,400.
- Diane Perrier, Budget Director, EOPSS Office of Grants and Research (OGR) (**Federal \$7,960, Non-Federal \$0**): Ms. Perrier provides grant set-up, accounting and reconciliation, fiscal monitoring, financial reporting, and fiscal close out. The budgeted costs (5% time) are only for the duties associated with public safety broadband and the SLIGP grant. The annual salary is \$79,600.

Michael Saltzman, Project Director (Federal \$158,100, Non-Federal \$0): Mr. Saltzman
joined the PSBO after a 36-year career with the Massachusetts State Police. Rising to the
rank of Major, he was responsible for technology and communications for the State Police.

In addition to bringing a comprehensive knowledge of key players, existing systems, and infrastructure, he also has the full view of deploying and operating data and voice communications systems in the broad context of statewide multi-jurisdictional and multi-discipline use. Mr. Saltzman will serve as the day-to-day director of the project under the lead of Undersecretary Wood. This resource is planned to be on the project for the duration of the grant.

- Sandy Bendremer, Broadband Subject Matter Expert (Federal \$130,000, Non-Federal \$35,000): Mr. Bendremer has advised EOPSS and other public safety agencies on a wide range of infrastructure and communications systems design, deployment, and operation. He has worked with the PSBO on the design and deployment of the statewide fiber optic backbone, P25 communications systems, as well as the use of BTOP funded middle mile projects for public safety. Mr. Bendremer has played a key role in requirements gathering and outreach on several statewide communications initiatives and will leverage that experience for the SLIGP. He is also familiar with existing government owned resources, security and hardening standards, commercial carrier relationships, and other elements of the SLIGP grant. He will serve a key role within the PSBO in providing technical consultation with users, FirstNet, AT&T, and others. Mr. Bendremer will lead identification and documentation of coverage issues on behalf of Commonwealth public safety users. Portions of this line item will be paid as cash match from the Commonwealth's IT Bond and/or the Commonwealth's 911 or general fund. 
