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Application Narrative Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

Applicant's Capacity, Knowledge, and Experience

The applicant for the State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) 2.0 is the Pennsylvania State Police (PSP), serving as the designated lead agency for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. PSP since its inception in 1905 has been dedicated to serving the public. It is PSP's stated desire to improve the ability to serve citizens with technology to increase the speed, accuracy, and availability of police and public safety data, so vital in today's informationdriven world. PSP has a complement of 4,719 sworn officers and 1,850 civilian employees. PSP has jurisdiction in all political subdivisions of the commonwealth and routinely provides assistance to municipal, state, and federal law enforcement agencies. The PSP provides fulltime or part-time police service to approximately 66 percent of the Commonwealth's municipalities, 60 percent of the Commonwealth's roadways, 82 percent of the Commonwealth's total land area, and 26 percent of the Commonwealth's total population. PSP provides primary police services to the majority of municipalities. The department is also tasked with a myriad of special functions created in response to legal mandates or public demand. PSP has 89 field station locations and various other offices across the state. PSP provides law enforcement and education services statewide, including investigative and laboratory services, municipal police officer training, lethal weapons training and licensing, drug evaluation and classification, and commercial vehicle inspection training, to name a few. PSP operates the Pennsylvania Criminal Intelligence Center and Commonwealth Law Enforcement Assistance Network (CLEAN), providing online access to criminal justice information to include: driver's licenses, motor vehicle registrations, and state criminal record history.

As an agency under the Governor's jurisdiction, PSP benefits from resources at the disposal of the Governor as well as from centralized review and control. Pennsylvania collects approximately \$28 billion of general funds annually for the operation of state government. Total state agency employment is approximately 79,000. The Governor's Executive Offices operate a centralized, integrated payroll, financial, and procurement system. All grant funds and grant expenditures are processed and tracked through this system, with centralized control provided by the state comptroller. The commonwealth complies with the Single Audit Act for federal funds.

Applicant's Qualifications

PSP is uniquely qualified to provide community outreach, law enforcement subject matter expertise, and experience as a system operator for public safety communications. The department has many points of involvement with the public, local law enforcement agencies, the entire first responder community, and all levels of government. PSP's enlisted members are highly respected throughout the commonwealth.

The PA-FirstNet team was assembled within PSP during the initial SLIGP project. This group of personnel, with expertise in various areas such as Global Information Systems (GIS), Radio Communications Policy, and Grants Management as well as having knowledge about the FirstNet initiative will be led by Pennsylvania's Single Point of Contact.

In July 2012, PSP assumed responsibility for operation of the Pennsylvania Statewide Radio Network (PA-STARNet), an 800 MHz land mobile radio system supported by an extensive microwave network. The system serves in conjunction with a VHF repeater communications system available to all PSP stations. These systems together provide an extensive footprint of antenna structures, facilities, and communications capacity across the state.

Under the direction of the Director of BCIS, PSP created the Communications Workgroup as an advisory committee to STARNet and the PA-FirstNet initiative. The committee is comprised of stakeholders from the Governor's Office of Administration, the Department of Transportation, the Emergency Management Agency (PEMA), the Department of Health, the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, the Fish and Boat Commission, the Game Commission and the Department of Military and Veteran's Affairs.

PSP is also co-chair with the Governor's Office of Administration for the Strategic Workgroup, a committee established to provide governance over the STARNet and PA-FirstNet initiatives.

Applicant's Staffing Plan

PSP will staff the grant implementation with resources from the Bureau of Communications and Information Services (BCIS).

Leadership is provided by Major Diane Stackhouse and Captain Sean Georgia. Major Stackhouse, the Director of BCIS, a sworn officer with 30 years of public safety and leadership experience is the designated Single Point of Contact (SPOC) for the project. Captain Georgia, the Director of Radio and Information Services Division of BCIS, a sworn officer with 23 years of experience serves as the Deputy SPOC for the project.

Grant control and oversight is provided by Major Patrick Brinkley, Director of the Bureau of Research and Development. The Bureau provides oversight and monitoring for most grants received by the Department.

Day-to-day operational support is provided by the Statewide Radio Network (STARNet) Division of BCIS.

The Project Lead and Grant Administrator, Holly Caudill, with over 12 years of grant management experience will continue in the lead role of the PA-FirstNet team for SLIGP 2.0. The lead brings experience from the Broadband Technology Opportunities Program (BTOP) and the original State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) and is supported by technical personnel within the Division. The Statewide Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC) is positioned within the STARTNet Division. J. Mark Wrightstone has over 35 years of experience in public safety radio communications. Twenty-five of those years have been with the commonwealth working for Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) and PSP. He has worked on interoperability issues with local governments and surrounding states for the past ten years.

The Policy and Communications Manager, Joseph Judge, has managed governance and policy activities for public safety communications for over four years within the department.

The GIS Manager, Adam Repsher, with over 11 years of mapping experience in public safety radio coverage will continue to support the SLIGP 2.0 project. Adam's expertise in GIS will assist the commonwealth in coordinating with AT&T and FirstNet as the network build begins.

Technical expertise from the Bureau, in addition to the personnel listed above, will be applied as required.

Applicant's Planned Activities for SLIGP 2.0

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's PA-FirstNet team will assist the FirstNet/AT&T team with addressing our public safety stakeholders with outreach and education on the rollout of the FirstNet project. Our public safety professionals participate within Counter Terrorism Task Force Regions and meetings on this level were productive during the original SLIGP award period.

To further support FirstNet, it is a recognized need to develop governance models and to create policies and procedures that will help state and local public safety entities work effectively with the FirstNet/AT&T team to foster adoption and use of the Nationwide Public Safety Broadband Network. Additional topics for discussion may be local control applications, cyber security, and identity credentialing and asset management (ICAM). Some of these discussions may transpire via webinar while others may be in person. The assistance of consultants with expertise in both public safety and technology would be sought for the project as well. Further details on the contractual portion of the project are included within the detailed budget.

The PA-FirstNet team will attend meetings and conferences to remain engaged with FirstNet and AT&T. The attendance at third party conferences such as IWCE, APCO, NENA as well as future SPOC conferences are included to keep the PA-FirstNet team up to speed on AT&T/FirstNet developments. Conferences will only be considered if they include a FirstNet track.

The budget allocated to personnel is **\$171,300**. These funds will be covered by state match with no federal funding intended to be used in this category. This is an in-kind match. Please see the detailed spreadsheet for calculations.

The Director of the Bureau of Communications and Information Services within the Pennsylvania State Police will dedicate an average of 10% of his or her time to perform the duties of the Single Point of Contact (SPOC). This role will provide project and grant oversight as well as possess authority over the project. This position relies heavily on information provided by the key positions on the project noted to be the Deputy SPOC, the SWIC, the Administrative and Grants professional and the Policy Specialist. The time is shown as 10% x 2 years on the detail. As needed, the percentage of time devoted to this project will increase.

A Deputy Single Point of Contact or Deputy SPOC is included in the personnel budget to provide project oversight and management for the full grant period. This person, a Captain within the Bureau of Communications and Information Services (BCIS) of the PA State Police, will be responsible for picking up duties in coordination with the SPOC and acting as the secondary SPOC whenever necessary. This position will devote up to 15% of his or her time to the project. The time for this person is shown as 15% x 2 years as the number of units in the detail spreadsheet.

Pennsylvania will use 15% of the Statewide Interoperability Coordinator's (SWIC's) time over the entire project period. This person currently works in the Statewide Radio Network (STARNet) Division as a Pay Range 10. The SWIC will work on much of the interoperability aspects of the project and coordination with users of the network. The time for this person is shown as 15% x 2 years as the number of units in the detail spreadsheet.

The Commonwealth is including support of a full-time Grants Manager to provide for procurement and budgeting needs as well as all grant reporting, administration and outreach/education presentations at user group meetings. This person will devote 30% of his or her time to the project for the full grant period as a Pay Range 9. This person will fully transition to SLIGP 2.0 grant administration at the end of the original SLIGP grant closeout, and will split time between the two grants until then. During the period in which this person is administering two grants, all activities will be documented to allocate accurately the percentage of time devoted to each project. As needed, the percentage of time devoted to this project will increase. The time for this person is shown as 30% x 2 years as the number of units in the detail spreadsheet.

A Policy Specialist is included in the budget to review all communications to stakeholders and government officials. This person will devote up to 15% of his or her time over the full two years of the grant. This position is a Pay Range 9. The time for this person is shown as $15\% \times 2$ years as the number of units in the detail spreadsheet.

A Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Manager will provide support to the project by providing 10% of his or her time for the full two years of the project. This person will use the data we received from surveys during the original SLIGP as well as information from

FirstNet and AT&T to assist in determining the prioritized areas where coverage improvements are desired. The time is shown as 10% x 2 years on the detail spreadsheet.

The budget allocated to Fringe Benefits is **\$128,700**. These funds will be covered by state match with no federal funding intended to be used in this category. This is an in-kind match. Please see the detailed spreadsheet for calculations.

Pennsylvania intends to cover the fringe benefits for the persons noted in the personnel section of our budget for the time they are devoted to the project over the grant period. Fringe benefits are shown at a percentage of their salaries, as provided by the Pennsylvania State Police budget office and remains at the same percentages as used in the original SLIGP. The number of units shown for each person on the detailed spreadsheet shows the same calculation of % of time multiplied by the number of years that they will contribute to the project as noted in the personnel section for each position.

The Director of the Bureau of Communications and Information Services within the Pennsylvania State Police will dedicate an average of 10% of his or her time to perform the duties of the Single Point of Contact (SPOC). Fringe is based on 74.24% of total salary for this sworn position and includes health, hospitalization, life insurance, worker's compensation and retirement benefits. Fringe cost calculation: Total annual salary x fringe benefit rate x time contribution.

The Deputy Single Point of Contact or Deputy SPOC position will dedicate an average of 15% of his or her time to the project to perform his or her duties. Fringe is based on 77.02% of total salary for this sworn position and includes health, hospitalization, life insurance, worker's compensation and retirement benefits. Fringe cost calculation: Total annual salary x fringe benefit rate x time contribution.

The Statewide Interoperability Coordinator's (SWIC's) will dedicate an average of 15% of his or her time to perform the duties of SWIC. Fringe is based on 67.23% of total salary for this civilian position and includes health, hospitalization, life insurance, worker's compensation, FICA and retirement benefits. Fringe cost calculation: Total annual salary x fringe benefit rate x time contribution.

The Grants Manager will dedicate an average of 30% of his or her time to perform duties for this project. Fringe is based on 78.18% of total salary for this civilian position and includes health, hospitalization, life insurance, worker's compensation, FICA and retirement benefits. Fringe cost calculation: Total annual salary x fringe benefit rate x time contribution.

The Policy Specialist will dedicate an average of 15% of his or her time to perform the duties necessary for the project. Fringe is based on 77.35% of total salary for this civilian position and includes health, hospitalization, life insurance, worker's compensation, FICA and retirement benefits. Fringe cost calculation: Total annual salary x fringe benefit rate x time contribution.

The GIS Manager will dedicate an average of 10% of his or her time to perform the duties necessary for the project. Fringe is based on 73.38% of total salary for this civilian position and includes health, hospitalization, life insurance, worker's compensation, FICA and

retirement benefits. Fringe cost calculation: Total annual salary x fringe benefit rate x time contribution.

The estimated costs to attend these meetings include travel, accommodations and subsistence and are estimated on the costs for travel to similar events during the original SLIGP award period.

The Commonwealth is including costs for five persons to attend IWCE, APCO and NENA meetings each year of the award period provided that a FirstNet representative is speaking at these conferences. The estimated costs to attend these meetings include travel, accommodations and subsistence and are estimated on the costs for travel to similar events during the original SLIGP award period.

The budget includes travel to regional meetings to be held for multiple states to consult with one another and share lessons learned. The estimated costs to attend these meetings include travel, accommodations and subsistence and are estimated on the costs for travel to similar events during the original SLIGP award period.

The remaining item within the travel category will cover the costs for two representatives from the PA-FirstNet team to travel around the state providing outreach and education assistance to the FirstNet and AT&T teams. This estimate is based on the scheduling of two meetings per year for each of the nine regional tasks forces. These estimates are also based upon the costs for similar travel during the original SLIGP award period.

The budget allocated to Contractual is **\$1,105,240**. This category will be covered by federal funding. Please see the detailed spreadsheet for calculations.

This category includes costs for two consultants with technical and public safety backgrounds to assist with stakeholder meetings whether they be FirstNet meetings or our own Governance and Policy discussions. The costs shown are based upon similar work completed during the original SLIGP award period and show a quantity that would allow for a total of four meetings per task force region (total of 9 regions) within Pennsylvania.

The Commonwealth recognizes the need to set up governance and assist in creating policy for our stakeholders and as a result, we are anticipating up to four webinars over the course of the two year award period of SLIGP 2.0. The topics for these webinars are still to be determined; however, they will likely involve topics such as applications and cyber security as well as Identity Credentialing and Access Management (ICAM) as well as Local Control and Coverage/Capacity. The costs that have been included within the budget for these webinars are based upon similar work completed during the original SLIGP award period.

A subscription to Constant Contact, an online application that houses all of our lists of public safety contacts within the commonwealth and allows for standardized meeting invitations was maintained during the original SLIGP award period. The cost for this subscription to continue into the SLIGP 2.0 award is included in this budget. The cost is based upon the number of stakeholder contacts held within the application. The anticipated cost for this subscription is \$1,350/year.

A Marketing and Outreach/Education website was created during the original SLIGP award period. For continuity, costs have been included within this budget to maintain the PA-FirstNet.com site. While outreach and education provided by the state is very limited on the SLIGP 2.0, this website has become a location that our stakeholders use to gather information on the project as well as the status of FirstNet.com marketing site as well as a tool to provide updates on the status of the rollout of AT&T's IOCs. This site will continue to be a location for our stakeholders to ask questions and locate contacts on the project. The costs shown are based upon those incurred during the original SLIGP award period.

The Smartboard purchased during the original SLIGP requires high speed internet connectivity and as such, a line item in the budget is included to provide this service allowing the device to be used for presentations within our conference room as well as allows for our office to participate in webinars. The monthly charge for this service has been increased on a yearly basis. The cost for this service has been estimated on the charges incurred during the original SLIGP award period plus the anticipated increase going into the 2018 calendar year.

Project Management to assist in setting up meetings at FirstNet's request as well as to drive attendance numbers of the targeted audience for these meetings is included in the budget. FirstNet's provided guidance suggests that they want to hold meetings but that the burden of selecting location and making arrangements for the meetings will be on the state. The Commonwealth would use a contracted project manager to handle these details on our

behalf. The costs listed for project management within our detailed budget also includes the rental of meeting space for any FirstNet outreach and education events.
