Gave a presentation to students in a Lake Area Tech Law Enforcement Class about FirstNet, mobile apps and interoperability. We included broadband and FirstNet capabilities where appropriate in the document. We continue our monthly cadence of the broadband subcommittee meetings to discuss current technology topics specific to broadband (mobile & wired) usage for public safety in South Dakota, ideally looking at interoperability and convergence with LMR. We've started the discussion of funding for "Statewide Interoperable Broadband Applications for Public Safety" in South Dakota. Identified and Planned to Transition PS Apps & Databases: Virtual meeting of the Broadband Sub-committee for SDPSCC Council to review information about various applications. Presentations included: Intrepid Networks, lamResponding.com, and discussion on Motorola statewide radio upgrade and how mobile broadband fits in that plan. Reviewed/discussed Bridge4PS application and how it is used in our state. Identify Ongoing Coverage Gaps: AT&T announced several new "FirstNet Commit" sites. These sites were part of the FirstNet Opt-in plan and most include 4G LTE, HD Voice, and Band Class 14. Contacted a Sheriff in one of the areas of "Cell phone purgatory" and they report to have better connectivity now. We discuss coverage issues and build out progress in each weekly meeting with AT&T. Every meeting we attend and every stakeholder we visit with we discuss coverage gaps and lack or impaired wireless service issues they have in their area. USDA announced they are investing millions in SD to provide broadband service in unserved and underserved rural areas. The Governor's proposed budget included \$100 million for the ConnectSD broadband grants in SD. These broadband projects will only improve public safety broadband communications and some of these areas will include backhaul for FirstNet towers. Any challenges or obstacles encountered and mitigation strategies you have employed: Ongoing issue with weekly dialogue is the outage reporting, billing, and ordering processes. The only mitigation strategy is to dialogue weekly and be patient while AT&T improves their business processes. Planned major activities for the next guarter: We will work to bring the SLIGP 2.0 FirstNet grant to a conclusion at the end of next guarter. We will continue to search for interoperable applications (or system) to be used across our state and nationwide. Continue the Public Safety Mobile Broadband subcommittee work. Help FirstNet Authority as we have two people to represent South Dakota and participate in focus groups to discuss selecting and fielding apps for operational purposes? Any additional project milestones or information: Good to see progress on the AT&T FirstNet build out with additional sites coming online. Submitted 11th Quarter SLIGP2.0 Performance Progress Report and the Federal Financial Report. Notified that NIST randomly selected our Quarter 10 progress report for additional review as part of grant audit monitoring efforts. We promptly submitted all information needed. Other allowable activities performed this guarter include: Quarterly call with our SLIGP2.0 NTIA Program Manager. Our governance council (SD Public Safety Communications Council) met (12/10/20) via video conference with discussion from the broadband subcommittee https://boardsandcommissions.sd.gov/Meetings.aspx?BoardID=24. Continue to monitor the press and social media for FirstNet knowledge and other LMR/LTE mobile broadband information. We continue collaboration with other neighboring states to discuss FirstNet experiences. Also have conference calls with AT&T (weekly) and FirstNet Authority. Attend (in person/online) various meetings webinars and inform our stakeholders through social media as appropriate.
