#### **Application Narrative**

#### Introduction

The State of Tennessee is applying for federal assistance pursuant to the National Telecommunications and Information Administration's (NTIA) Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) regarding the State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP) 2.0 (2018-NTIA-SLIGP-2). The State understands that the primary purpose of this grant opportunity is to provide support to states and territories as they further plan for NPSBN deployment and public safety user adoption in the post-State Plan period. The State of Tennessee intends to apply for the full allotment of \$700,000 and is fully prepared to comply with the 20% matching funds requirement of \$175,000 and all other requirements relating to the allowable activities for Opt-In states as described in Section D.6.a.i. The Table below illustrates the high-level funding scenario contemplated by our application.

#### Background

The State of Tennessee has been an active supporter of the National Public Safety Broadband Network (NPSBN) since its inception in 2012. Tennessee's active participation in the NTIA's SLIGP 1.0 funding opportunity has resulted in a preliminary Opt-In decision by Governor Haslam which was announced on August 31, 2017. The Governor's decision was based on input received from key stakeholders across the state regarding the potential benefits of the NPSBN to Tennessee's first responder community. The positive support from Tennessee's public safety community was the result of 32 months of extensive efforts on behalf of the TACN FirstNet project team members involving outreach and education activities, data collection activities, governance activities, and continuous coordination with NTIA, FirstNet, and AT&T personnel. The results achieved by the State of Tennessee in connection with SLIGP 1.0 have been recognized at the national level and have laid a solid foundation for the transition to operations as contemplated by NTIA under the SLIGP 2.0 grant program.

#### **Staffing Plan**

In support of NTIA's SLIGP 2.0 grant program, the State of Tennessee intends to leverage the project organization and governance structures established under SLIGP 1.0 that have served NTIA and FirstNet so well over the past 32 months. An overview of those organizations is as follows.

<u>Project Organization</u> – Tennessee's SLIGP 2.0 project organization will be organizationally located within the Department of Safety and Homeland Security (DOSHS) and will be led by the Director of Wireless Communications. The Director will function as the Single Point of Contact (SPOC) for the State of Tennessee and will provide oversight of the SLIGP 2.0 program within the State of Tennessee. The Director will be responsible for interacting directly with FirstNet and AT&T on all matters related to Tennessee's portion of the National Public Safety Broadband Network. He will establish the strategic direction for broadband within the state and will facilitate all governance meetings. The Director will also be responsible for oversight of all TACN FirstNet project team activities and be responsible for ensuring all programmatic grant requirements are fulfilled. The Director will spend 20% of his time on SLIGP 2.0 grant activities for the 2-year period of performance.

- The Deputy Director of Wireless Communications will report directly to the Director of Wireless Communications and will function as the Statewide Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC). The Deputy Director will be responsible for establishing interoperability practices within the state regarding LMR to LTE integration, identifying and implementing broadband related modifications to the Statewide Communications Interoperability Plan (SCIP), formulation and approval of statewide standards for device identification, talk-group naming, QPP policies and procedures, and Identity Credentialing and Access management (ICAM) policies within the state. The Deputy Director will spend 20% of his time on SLIGP 2.0 grant activities for the 2-year period of performance.
- A SLIGP 2.0 Project Coordinator will be selected and will coordinate all FirstNet related meetings and stakeholder activities including governance meetings, regional meetings, statewide broadband conferences, website activities, monthly newsletter publications, and travel planning. This person will also provide oversight of the grant program, including assuring completion of progress reports, managing the project's budget and financial reporting, and ensuring grant compliance. The Project Coordinator will work directly with administrative personnel within the State to ensure all grant management reporting requirements are met. The Project Coordinator will spend 20% of their time on SLIGP 2.0 grant activities for the 2-year period of performance.
- The State intends to continue the services of the public safety communications consulting firm
  that assisted the State under SLIGP 1.0. The firm will assist the State and its RAN Partner in
  establishing or enhancing existing capabilities related to governance, voice and data
  interoperability, ICAM, local control, QPP, cybersecurity, and other relevant aspects of wireless
  broadband communications. The public safety communications consulting firm may also be
  asked to further assist the state by supporting all statewide and regional FirstNet requested
  events, developing executive briefing materials, attending broadband related events,
  identification of best practices and providing project management functions as requested. The
  State envisions that the consulting firm will participate in teleconferences, work sessions,
  executive meetings, and industry events as requested and as necessary to support the SLIGP 2.0

program. The consulting firm will spend approximately 2,980 hours supporting the program over the 2-year period of performance.

#### **Governance Structure**

The State will leverage the existing governance structure of the TACN Advisory Panel (TACN AP) to provide executive oversight and to advise the SPOC on matters relating to the rollout and adoption of FirstNet within the State. The TACN AP will also provide guidance for the formulation of policies and procedures for LMR/LTE interoperability and emergency response communication throughout the state. The TACN AP has formed a Technical Working Group and an Operations Working Group to assist the SPOC regarding technical or operational matters related to the NPSBN.

#### **SLIGP 2.0 Organized Events**

<u>Regional Conferences</u> – Stakeholder involvement and communications will be essential in achieving the programmatic requirements of the SLIGP 2.0. Accordingly, the State intends to continue to organize and conduct regional conferences throughout the State for the purposes of furthering data interoperability, voice interoperability, and policies and procedures related to ICAM and QPP. The State plans to conduct up to six (6) regional meetings in areas throughout the state that are readily accessible to Tennessee's first responder community. The State envisions that the regional meetings will be attended by 25 to 50 area personnel and will last approximately four (4) hours each. These meetings will be conducted in the spring of each year and will be coordinated with and attended by personnel from FirstNet, AT&T, and NTIA as appropriate.

<u>Statewide Conferences</u> – The State intends to plan and conduct two Statewide Public Safety Broadband Conference each year. This conference will be held in Nashville, Tennessee and will be attended by approximately 150-200 members of Tennessee's first responder community. The statewide conferences will be held in the summer of each year and will be approximately eight (8) hours in duration. As with the regional conferences, the project team will coordinate the meeting time, agenda, speakers, etc. with NTIA, FirstNet, and AT&T as appropriate.

<u>Stakeholder Involvement</u> - Tennessee intends to leverage the stakeholder time spent participating in the regional and statewide conferences as an in-kind match for the state. Based on attendance at similar events conducted under SLIGP 1.0, the State expects the monetary value of the in-kind contribution to be calculated according to the table below. Average of \$27.65/hour for a total of 2,220 stakeholder hours.

- ✓ Planning efforts to help FirstNet gain inclusion on applicable statewide contract vehicles.
- ✓ Planning activities to prepare for emergency communications technology transitions.
- ✓ Activities to identify and plan for the transition of public safety applications, software, and databases.
- ✓ Identifying and documenting on-going coverage needs/gaps within the State.
- ✓ Activities to convene stakeholder outreach events to continue planning for NPSBN implementation, as requested by FirstNet.

#### Allowable Costs

The State of Tennessee has reviewed the allowable activities for States where FirstNet is deploying the RAN (Opt-In States) and intends to fully comply with the programmatic requirements as follows:

<u>Personnel Costs</u> – The State will use the salaries and fringe benefits for the Director, Deputy Director, and Project Coordinator as part of the state's in-kind match. Fringe benefits comprise the benefits that are provided by the State such as the State portion of the Medical Insurance, Dental Insurance, Retirement and other State provided benefits as selected by the individual.

<u>Travel Costs</u> – The State will utilize SLIGP 2.0 funds to provide for in state and out of state travel in accordance with Tennessee's travel policies. It is expected that SLIGP funds will be utilized for airfare, ground transportation, lodging, meals, and incidental expenditures associated with stakeholder attendance at governance body meetings, FirstNet meetings, data collection, or other allowable program activities.

<u>Supply Costs</u> – The State does not intend to incur any costs related to supplies.

<u>Contractual Costs</u> - The State intends to continue the contractual relationship with the public safety communications firm retained under SLIGP 1.0 to assist the State in all matters related to SLIGP 2.0. The State further intends to utilize SLIGP 2.0 funds for all costs associated with the public safety communications consulting firm.

<u>Other Miscellaneous Costs</u> – The State intends to leverage donated stakeholder time at regional, statewide events and other events as requested by FirstNet as a component of the state's matching portion of funds.

<u>Administrative Service Costs</u> - The State does not intend to incur any costs related to Administrative Service Costs.

*Legal Costs* - The State does not intend to incur costs related to Legal Costs.

Indirect Costs - The State does not intend to incur costs related to Indirect Costs.
