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APPLICATION NARRATIVE

BACKGROUND

The Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act of 2012 (Act) establishes the First Responder Network Authority (FirstNet) as an independent authority within the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) and authorizes FirstNet to take all actions necessary to ensure the design, construction, and operation of a nationwide public safety broadband network (NPSBN). The Act further directs NTIA to establish a grant program to assist state, regional, tribal, and local jurisdictions with identifying, planning, and implementing the most efficient and effective means to use and integrate the infrastructure, equipment, and other architecture associated with the NPSBN.

To support the directives of the Act, the NTIA established the State and Local Interoperability Grant Program (SLIGP), which provides funding to help states satisfy the statutory consultation requirement and to ensure the success of this congressionally mandated program. In 2013 SLIGP allocated \$515,628 in funding to the United States Virgin Islands (USVI) to support planning, consultation, and data collection activities related to the establishment of the USVI component of the NPSBN.

In preparation for the territory's initial consultation meeting with FirstNet and to the requirements of SLIGP, numerous federal, local, and volunteer agencies came together to determine wireless data needs, challenges, coverage expectations and limitations, current operating systems, and infrastructure needs for public safety agencies operating in the USVI. In support of this effort, data was collected and summarized in the form of graphs and charts to document the findings of federal, and local public safety wireless data usage and the initial desired condition of the USVI integration into the NPSBN. This formulated the basis for describing the public safety needs for the USVI centric plan as part of the NPSBN. The territory's Statewide Communications Interoperability Plan (SCIP) has been updated to include the goal of FirstNet and the public safety needs that it's expected to address.

SUMMARY OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

As a requirement of the SLIGP, FirstNet established goals that the USVI has satisfied over the period of performance. The FirstNetVI has demonstrated to NTIA that the territory is on track to accomplish these activities by the end of the grant period:

- Establish a governance structure, or expand existing structure, to consult with FirstNet
 - The Territory-wide Communications Interoperability Board (TWCIGB) was established via executive order in 2012 to direct the cooperative efforts of public safety and government interoperability. The board was later expanded to include

the Virgin Islands National Guard and other FirstNet stakeholders. The board was activated as a result of the SLIGP objectives and now meets on a quarterly basis.

- Develop procedures to ensure local and rural representation and participation in the consultation process
 - The FirstNetVI team prepared the territory for the Initial consultation with FirstNet by providing education and outreach sessions with public safety entities across the three major islands, gathering stakeholder input, and acting as an advocate for public safety. The meeting was a success with over 50 federal, local, and volunteer public safety stakeholders engaged. FirstNetVI delivered use cases like 1989 hurricane Hugo that could not have been more relevant today, in wake of twocategory five (5) hurricanes in September which decimated the communications infrastructure.
- Create a process for education and outreach among local and rural officials, public safety users, and other stakeholders about the nationwide public safety broadband network
 - FirstNetVI outlined and executed a plan to educate federal, and local decisionmakers about public safety broadband technology, including explaining the need for broadband, finances, and the importance of on-going maintenance. The plan extended to the legislative branch of government to garner support at that level as well as print materials and discussions with potential end-users. Website and social media presence continues to be a great avenue for keeping stakeholders informed and engaged.

Identify potential public safety users of the public safety broadband network

- FirstNetVI utilized the Emergency Support Functions (ESF) annex to identify potential users of the NPSBN. Federal, Local and non-governmental agencies were then briefed on FirstNet and the goal of NPSBN. A few are listed below for edification:
- Potential Local Users: Virgin Islands Territorial Emergency Management Agency (VITEMA), Virgin Island Police Department (VIPD), Fire Service, Emergency Management Services (EMS), Port authority police and Fire, Water and Power Authority (WAPA), Dept. of Public Works (DPW), Waste Management and others.
- Potential Federal Users: National Guard, Department of Homeland Security Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI), Coast Guard (USCG), Department of Justice (DOJ), Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), and others.
- o Potential non-governmental Users: St. Croix, St. Thomas and St. John Rescue.

Develop a standard memorandum of agreement (MOA) to facilitate the use of existing infrastructure with private sector entities that have been chosen by FirstNet to build, operate, and maintain the network on public safety infrastructure, or identify the legal barriers to creating a standard MOA and describe potential remedies

- We were in the initial stages of creating an MOU with the impacted organizations prior to the onset of the two category five (5) hurricanes. We will resume the creation of the MOU documents with the private sector organization early in 2018.
- Develop staffing plans that include local and rural representation in data collection activities in consultation with FirstNet
 - FirstNetVI conducted data collection surveys, hosted workshops and visited individual agencies in an effort to get a comprehensive representation of the USVI public safety community needs and requirements. The collected data was then summarized in the form of graphs and charts to document the findings of federal, and local public safety wireless data usage and the initial desired condition of the USVI integration into the NPSBN
 - Further as a result of the data gathering and staffing plans, two program managers were hired for the FirstNetVI program.

Prepare or modify a comprehensive plan as part of the existing Statewide Communications Interoperability Plan (SCIP) describing the public safety needs that FirstNet is expected to address

- The territory's SCIP was updated in 2015 to include a comprehensive plan for FirstNet and the challenges it aims to address.
- In 2017, an ESF-2 team from region-2 came to USVI and conducted reviews with stake holders to review and modify the SCIP. The output of that effort was not published due to being redirected by two category five (5) hurricanes. We anticipate the document from ESF-2 to be delivered in early 2018.
- Consult with FirstNet regarding coverage needs, user requirements, network hardening and resiliency requirements, and data collections activities as defined by FirstNet.
 - The USVI consulted with FirstNet facilitating a flow of information from potential end-users regarding coverage needs, user requirements, and unique challenges based on USVI geography. FirstNetVI undertook a major data collection effort resulting in fifty-four (54%) percent of identified potential user agencies being surveyed. Survey results and projected totals were then submitted to FirstNet.

Executive and Legislative Buy-in

• The Virgin Islands SPOC team championed the FirstNet initiative on the highest levels, escalating the discussion to the legislative floor in 2015 and again in 2016.

The organizational heads of the Virgin Islands Department of Health (DOH), Virgin Islands National Guard (VING), and Virgin Islands Fire Service (VIFS) all provided testimony supporting the FirstNet network buildout and highlighting the potential benefits to their respective agencies.

• The SPOC team along with the FirstNet Regional lead and government affairs representative met with the Governors' Chief of Staff and senior advisors on several occasions, providing executive level updates and understanding the concerns from the highest levels in an effort to gain valuable input for StatePlan development.

• State-Plan Opt-in/Opt-out Decision

 As a result of continued collaboration with FirstNet and the FirstNetVI team, outreach and education to end-user, decision makers, legislative and executive level branch, the USVI became the first territory to Opt-In to the FirstNet network. Governor Kenneth Mapp announced his decision stating, it is in the best interest of the United States Virgin Islands and the Country to participate in the FirstNet deployment of the National Public Safety Broadband Network."

Nationwide Participation

• The USVI participated in all SPOC meetings over the period of performance. The multi-day events allowed the territory to stay informed on developments in the deployment of the NPSBN and on-going FirstNet efforts to better align the territory's plan to national level planning, while fostering lasting relationships with fellow SPOCs and SPOC team members.

INTENDED ALLOWABLE ACTIVITIES

The USVI intends to use the SLIGP-2 funding to prepare the territory for the deployment of the NPSBN post-Opt-in decision.

Coverage

Assess the current infrastructure needs for public safety post hurricanes Irma and Maria. The backto-back category five (5) storms, dealt the island a one-two blow, decimating the territory's communications infrastructure. Therefore, we will need to reverify the original coverage identification effort performed within the SLIGP-1 grant to account for any substantial changes in the coverage areas. The team will work to identify and document on-going coverage needs/gaps within the territory by way of but not limited to drive testing and crowdsourcing.

Education & Outreach

The territory at the request of FirstNet will plan, coordinate, and facilitate FirstNet and AT&T stakeholder outreach events to continue planning for the NPSBN implementation. FirstNet will

use these sessions to educate the potential public safety users on the network solution and user subscription requirements.

The USVI will facilitate the following events per request by FirstNet and its network partner, AT&T:

- Local, Statewide, or Regional Broadband Conference: State or territory convenes local, state, tribal, and/or federal agency representatives to provide FirstNet an opportunity to educate potential users about the FirstNet solution (e.g., devices, services, applications), relay updates related to the network buildout, solicit feedback, and answer questions.
- Focus Groups: State or territory convenes participants from a specific discipline (e.g., law enforcement) or user community (e.g., rural audience) to allow FirstNet to solicit input regarding a specific topic (e.g., applications, devices, network services, cybersecurity).
- Products & Solutions Workshops: State or territory convenes participants to allow FirstNet to demonstrate use of particular software, application, or device and solicit feedback.
- Lessons Learned Workshop: State or territory convenes participants from across disciplines and jurisdictions to share lessons learned on various topics related to NPSBN implementation (e.g., procurement, adoption, incident response).

FirstNetVI will host at least four (4) workshops annually and conduct other planning activities to educate potential users on available wireless technologies, public safety applications, software, and databases in an effort to prepare our public safety users for emergency communications technology transitions.

Grant Management and Planning

The SPOC and Program Manager will provide ongoing coordination with NTIA and implement grant funds based on allowable cost. The team will perform planning activities to identify additional potential end-users of the NPSBN, conducting surveys and other methods to meet that objective.

The USVI will perform Data Collection activities as requested by FirstNet

Governance

FirstNetVI team to present relevant and up-to-date information to the TWCIGB, while receiving input to contribute towards planning activities and to further identify potential users of the NPSBN. FirstNetVI plans to use this group as a project champion as we work with the territory's public safety community to develop policies and agreements to encourage and/or increase sharing of data between agencies using the NPSBN.

FirstNetVI will work with the governing board to develop formal policies in accordance with FirstNet guidelines that address development, security, access, prioritization, disaster recovery, and continuity of operations

Based on the impact of hurricanes Irma and Maria on the territory's wireless technology infrastructure, the USVI seeks to be an early adopter of FirstNet in preparation for the upcoming hurricane season.

CAPACITY, KNOWLEDGE, AND EXPERIENCE

To ensure there is effective project governance, the following Bureau of Information Technology (BIT) staff resources are assigned to this project with the designated roles, responsibilities, and authority

- The Chief Information Officer (BIT Staff) will serve as the FirstNet State Single Point of Contact (SPOC) providing executive level support and a direct liaison to the Governor to help FirstNet gain inclusion on applicable contract vehicles. The SPOC will work to eliminate project barriers and garner resources. Has final authority on all decisions.
- **Finance Manager (BIT Staff)** will serve as the Financial Manager, performing all SLIGP-2 financial requirements, a continuation from functioning in that capacity for SLIGP-1 as of 2016. The Financial Manager holds a Masters of Accounting (MAcc) degree and has a strong 8-year background in monitoring federally funded programs to ensure compliance and adherence to established guidelines.
- Chief Technology Officer (BIT Staff) will provide guidance on technical issues to the FirstNet project. The CTO interacts with all stakeholders and provides guidance and leadership with regards to hardware and software that directly affect the functionality of the FirstNet network. In addition, the CTO makes recommendations and develop policies in collaboration with the CIO, in order to facilitate the implementation of FirstNet within the territory. The CTO is Cisco and Microsoft certified with 15yrs+ of networking experience.
- Facilities Manager (BIT Staff) also serves as the Statewide Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC) for the Virgin Islands and has twenty-three (23) years of tower communications experience. Certified tower climber, Certified Data Center Technician and is responsible for maintaining and installing radio, TV, two-way radio, microwave antennas.
- **Project Manager (BIT Staff)** will provide programmatic guidance to the team, implement project management best practices for program success. He is a certified Project Manager with the PMP (Project Management Professional) designation. His accumulated 25yrs+ experience has been as an Electrical Engineer, Facilities Manager and Project Manager.

Program Manager (Grant Funded) Will serve as the programmatic manager for SLIGP-2, providing continuity of operations after functioning in that capacity for SLIGP-1 from 2014 to current. The Program Manager holds a Six Sigma Black Belt certification and is an early 2018 MBA candidate with a concentration in project management.

STAFFING EFFORT FOR SLIGP-2

Personnel resources to support SLIGP-2 and FirstNet requirements include:

- Program Manager (Full-time)
- Program Coordinator (Full-time)
- Legal Council (contract)
- Technical Experts (contract)
- **Program Manager** (Full-time) to assist the SPOC with programmatic and grant management requirements. The Program Manager will organize, plan, execute, control, and evaluate activities associated with the SLIGP grant, at a salary of \$70,000/year plus the cost of Fringe benefits. Coordinate with the territory's Statewide Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC) on public safety-related projects. The Program Manager will also be responsible for providing ongoing coordination with NTIA and the implementation of grant funds, as well as any other duties as assigned by the SPOC. The development and scheduling of all training and workshops to ensure maximum education of the scope and functions of FirstNet as it progresses from planning to implementation to operation stages. Will oversee the attendance at training events to ensure all SPOC team members stay current on the overall FirstNet program elements.
- **Program Coordinator** (Full-time) to provide administrative support, assist with milestone tracking, assist the finance manager with tracking grant operation funds/budget, draft Quarterly PPRs and other grant-related documents and reports. The Program Coordinator will identify and document project issues as required, coordinate meetings, conferences, webinars, and other project support activities as needed, at a salary of \$50,000/year plus the cost of Fringe benefits. Will also produce press releases, draft Newsletters, and manage online content that supports the efforts of FirstNet and highlights the accomplishments in the USVI via FirstNetVI social media pages, YouTube, and FirstNetVI website.
- Legal Council will be contracted to provide expert and strategic legal advice to the USVI and its efforts in implementing the NPSBN. Review documents provided to the Government of the Virgin Islands from NTIA, FirstNet, AT&T and any other governmental or non-governmental entity as it relates to the FirstNet network.
- **Technical Subject Matter Experts** (SMEs) will be contracted to provide functional and technical expertise and support. Understand the vision proposed by FirstNet and the needs

of the Public Safety stakeholders in the USVI. Consult with FirstNet and ATT to ensure the user needs are being addressed. Work to determine current coverage needs and gaps. Coordinate testing and create a test management plan. Develop written recommendation and propose technical solutions.

OUTCOMES AND OBJECTIVES OF ACTIVITIES

The United States Virgin Islands intends to utilize SLIGP-2 funding to coordinate efforts within the territory post-Opt-In decision in preparation for the NPSBN deployment. FirstNetVI's governance and outreach activities and interactions will serve as a conduit to help FirstNet gain inclusion and support throughout the first responder community, expanding the potential subscriber base. As we prepare the territory for the deployment and implementation of the NPSBN, the goal is to identify coverage gaps in the existing wireless network infrastructure post hurricanes Irma and Maria. This initiative will create the framework for a more resilient communications network that public safety personnel can rely every day and during natural disasters. With the Education and Outreach activities, we aim to educate potential subscribers on the upcoming enhancements to public safety tools, software, and applications which will mitigate communication difficulties and inefficiencies in times of crisis and confusion. We also hope to provide an avenue for FirstNet and AT&T to educate the first responder community on Network implementation and Service agreements.

SUMMARY

The United States Virgin Islands through the Bureau of Information Technology, successfully managed and executed the budgetary and programmatic requirements of the State and Local Implementation Grant Program despite a 1-year no-cost extension that placed a financial strain on the office leading to staffing cuts and increased in-house support.

The Virgin Islands remains dedicated to the mission of FirstNet and our commitment to the first responder community. Governor Mapp demonstrated his commitment in July becoming the first (1st) territory to Opt-in to FirstNet. The Governor's Opt-in decision allows FirstNet/AT&T to build and maintain the LTE Radio Access Network (RAN) at no cost to the USVI for a period of twenty-five (25) years. FirstNetVI will use SLIGP-2 funding to prepare the territory and its public safety community for the build-out and implementation of the NPSBN.

As we recently observed in wake of hurricane's Irma and Maria, the Virgin Islands is susceptible to natural disasters that can severely compromise the communications infrastructure. The territory lost nearly all communications (cellular and landline) out of St. Thomas and St. John when Category 5 hurricane Irma struck on September 6, 2018. Two short weeks later, on September 19th, St. Croix suffered the same fate at the hands of category five (5) hurricane Maria. The consecutive storms brought to light some major concerns in emergency response and we will work

with our partners at FirstNet and AT&T to find a resilient solution for the people of the Virgin Islands, which means deploying a truly interoperable nationwide system for first responders.

The safety of the people of the Virgin Islands and those who come to enjoy our beaches is the territory's number-one priority. FirstNet will provide first responders with the best technology possible to serve and protect the residents and visitors on this territory. As we witnessed in the aftermath of Hurricanes Irma and Maria, our first responders are often the only hope for safety in rapidly-changing and life-threatening situations. The FirstNet network will transform the way Virgin Islands' fire, police, EMS and other public-safety personnel communicate and share information resulting in better coordination, faster and more efficient response to emergencies.

The future resiliency of the territory's communications network depends on the successful buildout and implementation of FirstNet. As we transition from response to recovery, the support we received and continue to receive from FirstNet and AT&T has been greatly beneficial to reestablishing stable communications in the territory. While most of the territory remains without commercial power, internet, and landline phone service, eighty (80 %) percent of cellular service has been restored despite being on generator power at most tower-sites for over 100 days.

The Virgin Islands in collaboration with FirstNet/AT&T, will move forward to achieve our common goal of connecting first responders to the critical information they require when handling day-to-day operations, supporting large events, like the annual Carnival Festivals on St. Croix, St. John and St. Thomas, triathlon, and Agricultural Fair on St. Croix, and responding to emergencies to include natural disasters.

The United States Virgin Islands (VI) formally requests a waiver of the SLIGP 2 Notice of Funding requirement regarding the first increment of funding. In July 2017, the Virgin Islands received supplemental funding of \$80,000 to retain one full-time employee dedicated to fulfilling all FirstNet and SLIGP obligations through the end of SLIGP1 programmatic period. The VI requests that NTIA award the full first increment amount and decrease the second increment by the amount of supplemental funding expended based on the final 425 Financial Report which will be submitted in May 2018.

This resource allocation strategy will allow the Virgin Islands to better prepare the territory for the deployment and implementation of the NPSBN from day one of SLIGP2. We aim to host the territory's post-Opt-In kick-off meeting with FirstNet/ATT team which was thwarted by hurricanes Irma and Maria. as well as employ strategies to meet the goals outlined in the grant application, specifically identifying coverage gaps in the existing wireless network infrastructure after the impact of two category 5 hurricanes.
